### **Berries**



Supply of raspberries remains tight as we reach the end of the Moroccan season and the start of the British one. The warmer weather in the UK is causing some issues with softer fruit and, while we have worked with suppliers to grade out affected product and maintain supply, there are market-wide availability challenges. We expect around another week or so before we are fully into the UK market.

There is better news for strawberries, where we're seeing some exceptional early season quality, with the sunny days and cooler nights delivering super sweet berries.

### **Butternut squash**



There have been some Port Authority delays, which have caused some issues. While that is a short-term issue, we are expecting some more significant challenges at the end of June and into July, when we anticipate the South African season will finish earlier than expected due to frosts.

With northern hemisphere planting taking place later than planned, we will be monitoring the situation very closely over the coming weeks as the transition will be difficult.

### **Sweet Potato**



The market remains very short, with the American harvest around 40% down on a standard year, although there are still some limited stocks available from that origin.

While we do not have any current availability issues, we are expecting market-wide challenges during July. We will continue to source produce from Portugal for around another week or so, before we transition to Argentina. This should bridge the gap before the start of the Egyptian season at the end of July/ beginning of August.

However, a recent sandstorm has affected one of the growing regions in Egypt and we are working with suppliers to assess the impact on the upcoming harvest.

### Cauliflower



We are now sourcing all British produce for our cauliflower. We have been seeing some slight issues with the colour of the head, which has been caused by the warm and sunny weather we saw earlier this month.

# **Purple Sprouting Broccoli**



After a challenging transition to the UK, availability is improving, bringing some additional colour to the menu and easing the supply issues that we've seen in the past couple of weeks.

### **Parsnips**



The British parsnip season should come to an end this week, and will be replaced by Spanish produce.

As we transition, we will be maintaining a close watch on the Spanish crop, as there may be some problems caused by the heavy rains during the growing period.

### Melons



Availability is currently good, with all melons now coming from the Almeria region of Spain.

However, this is one of the most

challenging periods of the year, and we are working with suppliers to manage the transition to the Murcia region in mid to end-June, which has the potential to be difficult.

### Leeks



As we approach the end of the British season, there are some issues with quality. However, we are expecting some delayed stocks from France and Spain and, once they arrive, we expect to see an improvement in quality.



Our supply is currently a mix of Spanish and British produce as we approach the end of the Spanish season and the start of the UK one. The transition is progressing well, and we expect to be all-British by the end of next week.

# **Grapes**



We are very pleased to report that new season speciality grapes will be available much sooner than anticipated. We now expect Sable and Cotton Candy grapes to be available as soon as the middle of June when we will see the first arrivals of Egyptian fruit.

# **Peaches and Nectarines**



These fantastic seasonal lines are now available again. They will remain in stock until around the end of August. These much-awaited fruits will come from Italy this year, supported by some Spanish produce. The fruit will be delivered in either fully recyclable cardboard packaging or home compostable packs.

# Savoy cabbage

As a result of storms and heavy rain in Colombia, there are significant availability challenges from that region. In order to avoid shortages, we will be reliant on air-freighted produce from Kenya for the next two to three weeks, until we can resume sea-freighted Colombian produce.
